Football Officiating Tips

- 1. Always have courage to pick up your flag if you realize there was no foul.
- 2. Always stop the clock after all fourth down plays.
- 3. Try not to disqualify unless it's a must.
- 4. Always improve on your signaling.
- 5. Make sure your signaling is always very clear.6. After calling a foul, keep officiating.7. Always know the status of the ball.

- 8. Always be alert for running and passing situations.
- 9. During time-outs, don't huddle around other officials.
- 10. Try not to let your emotions run wild when irritated.
- 11. Always be aware of the current game time.
- 12. Try not to over eat during the off-season. Stay in shape.
- 13. Start your off season conditioning program early.
- 14. Always cooperate with coaches during all situations.
- 15. Stay far enough away from the play to avoid being apart of the play.
- 16. Keep accurate records during the game.
- 17. Keep locker room for officials only.
- 18. Always see the ball prior to sounding your whistle.
- 19. Always be alert of the down, distance and spot of ball.
- 20. Always be clear when giving your explanation to the Referee.
- 21. Be careful on spotting the ball. Keep it accurate.
- 22. Always be alert for continuing action fouls.
- 23. Always keep the game under control.
- 24. Always be aware of the line-to-gain.
- 25. Stop the game clock if line-to-gain appears to be reached. (NFHS and NCAA).
- 26. Never look for fouls, only see them.
- 27. When you see a foul think to yourself, "That's a foul, that's a foul, NOW it's a foul" Don't be too hasty in throwing your flag.
- 28. When observing a play, keep your whistle in your hand until you see the ball to avoid a possible "inadvertent whistle"
- 29. Attempt to get the player's number when calling a foul.
- 30. Never look for fouls; only see them.
- 31. Answer questions from coaches and players respectively.
- 32. Always act calm and professional under all game situations.
- 33. Referees should conduct an extensive pre-game meeting to discuss potential game situations.
- 34. Always know how many players are on the field.
- 35. Use preventive officiating when possible.
- 36. Never question the judgment of any official, either during or after the game.
- 37. During the season and off-season, always study the rules well.
- 38. The 3 C's of officiating: Consistency, Communication and Control.
- 39. When officiating call fouls only in your zone, it will keep you out of trouble!
- 40. If you are in the proper position to see the play, you will always get it right.
- 41. Know the down and distance on all plays.
- 42. Communicate, Communicate, And Communicate!
- 43. Stay focused.
- 44. DELIBRATE, DELIBRATE, DELIBRATE.
- 45. Doubts = Legal play.
- 46. Try not to fully concentrate on the player; watch around the player too.
- 47. During a pass, never watch the ball only for a split second to see where it's going; concentrate on the receivers.

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- 48. It's a good idea to hustle on the field. It gives players and coaches a sense that you are really into the game.
- 49. Don't listen to the sidelines, they only put you off.
- 50. Never let anyone else change your penalty, only you can change it.

- 51. Don't say anything to players or coaches that you don't want said to you.
- 52. See the play, don't be talked into anything.
- 53. Go to the bathroom before the game.
- 54. ALWAYS call the fouls designed for safety: clipping, face mask, etc.
- 55. If you call it in the first quarter, call it in the fourth quarter.
- 56. Whether it is 0-0, 55-0, or 27-27, that illegal act that you see is a FOUL.
- 57. Get to the goal line before the runner does. You never know.
- 58. If you miss a call, let the coach (respectfully) have his say.
- 59. If you KNOW the down, time remaining, etc. is wrong, or that a rule has been misapplied, keep the ball dead.
- 60. If you miss one (and you will), keep officiating. Fretting just diverts your attention.
- 61. Never panic or get flustered. It just makes it worse.
- 62. Look the part and dress well. You'll fool a lot of people just by your presence.
- 63. Nobody cares about last night's game; today's game is the most important one in the world.
- 64. Never change your call, on what a coach say's; make sure that you know that you should change it first.
- 65. The ball doesn't commit fouls players do!
- 66. Don't make a show; let the kids be the show and let them play!
- 67. Always stay calm with players and coaches when they are arguing with you. Let them make their claim and then explain the call.
- 68. Don't avoid or seek out a coach after the game is over.
- 69. Always call what you think not what the coach yells.
- 70. Don't become a player's buddy during the game, communicate safety and fair play.
- 71. Slow down. Slowing down the game will help you see and understand the intent of the rules. If you think your going too slow...slow down some more.
- 72. Build a good repetitive pattern and be able to concentrate on that pattern for :07 to :10 sec each time.
- 73. In a discussion with a coach, never be the first to speak and make the last word respectful.
- 74. See as many snaps as you can and learn from your own and other's mistakes.
- 75. Officiate every game as if you are being observed because you never know who is watching.
- 76. Take it one play at a time.
- 77. When things get chaotic and they will, remain calm and focused.
- 78. Be a good dead ball official.
- 79. Please watch your language while officiating.
- 80. Get better each game.
- 81. If you officiate a team where you've had to flag a coach before, don't let that "history" get to you. Every game is a new game!
- 82. When a play is challenged, always maintain an open mind, no matter what team is going to be benefited by it.
- 83. Don't walk on the field. Always run or jog.
- 84. See the foul, get the number, and throw the flag.
- 85. HUSTLE!
- 86. Don't be a buddy with the coaches, that will make you look suspicions even if you don't intend to.
- 87. Ask questions of veteran officials. Their input can go a long way in your approach to "getting better".
- 88. Don't question officials on the field, but don't be hesitant to after the game. By all means, ASK QUESTIONS!
- 89. If you see it happen, it happened! Don't let someone talk you into changing your call.
- 90. Arrive to a game site early enough to change clothes and have a good pre game discussion.
- 91. Be clear in your explanation when ruling on a coach's or "up stairs ref" challenge; give specific reasoning for the call, always explain what occurred during the play.

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- 92. Be consistent throughout the whole game; be fair to the players, coaches and the fans.
- 93. Concentrate, Concentrate, Concentrate! Don't let your mind wander. See leather!
- 94. Never issue threats to players or coaches. Don't say you will do something, if you are not prepared to do it.
- 95. Know your keys before every play.
- 96. During the game, act like you want to be there. Don't act like you're daydreaming or drowsy.
- 97. Put as much into the game as the players. They have worked all week for this game.
- 98. HAVE FUN!
